Collaborative Efforts

Over the past couple of months, my office has participated in collaborative efforts that have augmented resources for District 5 communities. Two years ago, Welcome All became the first public park to receive a new basketball court, courtesy of the Atlanta Hawks Foundation's Court Renovation Program. In July of 2016 and June of 2017, the Atlanta Hawks hosted two basketball camps which served over 200 boys and girls ages 7-15. This July, on behalf of the Atlanta Hawks Foundation, Dominique Wilkins presented 500 backpacks filled with supplies for youth returning to school. Each backpack contained composition notebooks, a Hawksbranded folder and bracelet, crayons, index cards, glue sticks, markers, pencils, and a pencil sharpener. In late August, the Hawks donated 200 more backpacks to my office and the Hawks Cheerleaders participated as we presented the bags to the Carver Cluster School students.

Also, my office joined Fulton County Government's Certified Public Manager Program inaugural class and <u>Vision To Learn in</u> free eye screenings that culminated with 100+ youth receiving free eye glasses. The Chick-fil-A Foundation provided free lunches to all the youth. We are thankful for socially responsible corporate and nonprofit partners. Through these collaborative efforts, we can supplement what we can do and who we can reach.





Increasing Opportunities

To kick off the summer, my office in collaboration with WorkSource Fulton hosted the <u>2017 Accelerated Youth Employment Initiative</u> to help rising freshmen through seniors obtain summer employment. Some of the employers included Waffle House, Wendy's, ABM, Cracker Barrel, and Murray Security. In concert with this initiative, I worked with the Board of Commissioners to pass a resolution that secured \$500,000 for nearly 250 youth to gain summer employment. Fulton County offered paid summer internships in its various departments. Corporate partners teamed up with us to provide meaningful opportunities for these youth ages 16-24 that live in areas affected by high unemployment and crime rates. We are working to provide sustainable solutions to curb juvenile delinquency through opportunities that enrich the lives of our youth.

Also, this summer, Fulton County graduated another class of Fulton County Youth Commissioners at Zoo Atlanta, located in District 5, where I served as emcee. To be youth commissioners, students must show not only scholastic excellence, but also a commitment to service. Youth Commissioners represent all districts in Fulton County.
