Greetings Neighbors and Friends,

Whether attending special events or hosting town halls, when visiting HJC Bowden Senior Multipurpose Center, the seniors always give me valuable feedback about our facility, services, and staff. Fulton County has had many challenges concerning its facilities and their need for repairs, upgrades, and maintenance. Over the past year, the Board of Commissioners dedicated \$209M+ to go toward maintenance and upgrades of Fulton County's facilities, which include libraries. Of that projected amount, \$1.1M+ is being invested in the Bowden Center. Another \$200k is dedicated toward the construction of a space in the John C. Birdine Neighborhood Center, where the Bethlehem Center seniors will be relocated. This new District 5 senior location is projected to open in October of this year.

In March, Fulton County announced its new <u>Director of Aging, Dr. Pamela Roshell</u>. Dr. Roshell brings over 20 years of experience in public administration, health policy, and gerontology. Prior to her appointment, Dr. Roshell served as the Regional Director for the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services and in a variety of leadership roles at AARP, including State Director for AARP Georgia where she provided management, leadership, and consumer advocacy to AARP's 1 million+ members in Georgia. With new leadership and increased resources, we hope to improve the quality of services and seniors' overall experience at our centers.

## Youth Champions: Our Youth Are Achievers

Our youth are both scholars and achievers in their classrooms and in their extracurricular activities. Commissioner Emma I. Darnell and I were honored to host the <u>Fulton County Basketball champions</u> from both Districts 5 and 6. The basketball champions for District 6 were the Benjamin E. Mays Lady Raiders and the Langston Hughes Panthers. The basketball champions from District 5 were the South Atlanta Hornets and the Atlanta Wolfpack. The <u>Atlanta Wolfpack</u> is the Atlanta Public Schools' wheelchair basketball team, with players from Carver, Douglass, and South Atlanta high schools, Long Middle School, and Perkerson Elementary School.

My office hosts annual initiatives to engage youth that live in District 5 and beyond. During Spring Break, my office, in collaboration with WorkSource Fulton, hosted an expo for youth interested in television, film, and interactive media careers at AmericasMart. Over 500 youth attended the event and engaged over 50 employers from both technical and entertainment industries. With current spikes in juvenile crime, I realize that Fulton County must share in the onus of filling our youth's voids of idle time with enriching activities and opportunities. The United Negro College Fund states it best, "a mind is a terrible thing to waste, but a wonderful thing to invest in." Therefore, the Fulton County Board of Commissioners is investing \$1M in crime prevention for both youth programming and employment through a comprehensive plan I co-sponsored. #Achievement

  Word Count, number of lines or number of pages.
- Submission must be a Word or PDF document, Submission must be a Word or PDF document, in English, typed (no hand-written entries), DS (double spaced) with a 12 pt Arial, Courier or Times Roman font. Use a one-inch margin on all pages. Number all pages in a header, including the first page, and include title of story next to page number. Do not include your name in header. Your cover sheet will be removed during the judging phase, to insure fair and impartial review of all submissions.

These initiatives are for all high school students who live in Fulton County, Georgia.

Write To Rise is a 6-week young writer's workshop that takes place Saturdays only at Wolf Creek Library beginning June 10 through July 22, 2017. The workshop is aimed at enhancing students' imagination and writing skills. The workshop includes authors, writers, and industry professionals who will guide participants through a comprehensive preparation that focuses on both personal and professional development as a writer.
