


# Public Safety: All People Are Safe

Due to the rising crime at gas stations in South Fulton, Commissioner Emma I. Darnell, District 6, and I hosted a public safety town hall at the Southwest Arts Center on January 12th. We are taking steps to ensure the residents of our districts are safe where they live, work, play, pray, and pay! As an Executive Sponsor of Public Safety in Fulton County, I sponsored a resolution that allowed gas stations and convenience stores that have high incidents of crime to employ certain security measures to avoid having their alcohol licenses suspended. In doing so, we are trying to work with the business owners and at the same time ensure "all people are safe." Daphne Jordan, founder of <u>Safer Communities in South Fulton</u>, formerly known as High Crimes in South Fulton, brought the legislation to me and I presented it to the Board of Commissioners. Although it failed the first time because of a lack of four affirmative votes, it passed the second time with six affirmative votes. I would like to thank Daphne Jordan for her efforts and activism in our community.

Many businesses have complied with the amended code and are working with Fulton County Police to protect patrons. Fulton County Police has stationed officers at some gas stations that had high incidents of slider crime and theft. During our town hall, Atlanta City Council President Ceasar Mitchell and Councilmen Michael Julian Bond and Kwanza Hall offered their support and listened to the concerns of residents. At the town hall, we were also joined by the Nation of Islam and Christian ministers united to restore safety and peace to our communities. Stay tuned for more ways you can become involved!





# 2017 Black History Film Festival

On Friday, February 17th at Wolf Creek Library, my office hosted the Opening Reception of our annual Black History Film Festival. We screened <u>Take Me Home</u>, a short documentary produced by the American Heart Association featuring Atlanta native and former record executive, <u>Shanti Das.</u> Maynard and Wendy Jackson premiered the trailer of <u>Maynard Jackson</u>, <u>Jr.</u>, a documentary about their father, the first black mayor of a southern city. <u>Actor Lamman Rucker</u> and co-stars, <u>Lovie Simone</u> and <u>Desiree Ross</u>, helped us award \$1000 to winners of the annual My Unsung Hero Essay and Film Competitions sponsored by Friends of Wolf Creek.

On Saturday, February 18th, the Black History Film Festival continued at both Wolf Creek and Metropolitan Libraries. Some of the movies screened were: The Clinton 12, Black Friday, February 1, and We the People from Crispus Attucks to Barack Obama. With Urban Film Review and DC Mayor Muriel Bowser, Black History Film Festival has expanded to Washington, DC and will take place in the historic Lincoln Theatre. Next year, neighboring counties, DeKalb and Clayton, will join us and host the film festival. As an Executive Sponsor of Arts and Culture, I am proud to report that the film festival received national recognition from the National Association of Counties (NACo) where I serve on the Arts Commission.
